


SUMMER CHOICE BOARD FOR RISING 3RD GRADERS

Write a book review and give it to a friend to read! Tell about what you liked and what you didn't like about the book.	Illustrate a new cover for the book. Include the title, author, illustrator, and your new design.	Write an email to the author. Tell him/her one thing you enjoyed, one thing you would change, and one question you still have.	Write a poem about the main character, setting, or topic. (For example, you may choose an acrostic poem and use the name of the main character.)	Write a summary of a fiction book. Include the main character, setting, problem, and solution.	Write a summary of a nonfiction book. Include the main idea and at least 3 supporting details.
Write an alternate ending or next chapter of a book.	Write a letter to the main character in the book. Give them advice on how to solve the main problem.	Pretend you are interviewing a character in your book. Write down 5 questions you would ask, and predict what their answers might be.	Make a travel brochure advertising a setting from the book persuading people to visit.	Create a poster presentation that summarizes your book.	Choose one event from your book. Write a nonfiction newspaper article reporting on the event.
Prepare a PowerPoint, Google Slides, or Prezi.com presentation summarizing the book.	Create a 10 question quiz for a book. Find another rising 3 rd grader who has read the same book and have them take your quiz!	Create a glossary for a nonfiction book.	Create a comic strip that illustrates the main events in the book.	Write a postcard to a family member telling them about what you read.	Create a timeline that details the main events, in order, in the book. Include specific dates when you can.
