Choose a character from your book and pretend to be them. Write a poem about yourself or someone else in your life. Be descriptive and detailed.	Design a new video game, app, or line of toys to help promote this book.	Write a postcard to a family member telling them about the book you read.	Consider how the author's life may have influenced how he/she wrote the text. What do you think led the author to write this book?	Choose a problem from the book. Was the problem solved? How? Write a different solution for the problem.	List parts of the text that appeal to each of the five senses: see, hear, smell, taste, touch.
You will be traveling to the place where your novel took place. Create an itinerary for your trip.	Write a letter to the main character in the book. Give them advice on how to solve the main problem they are facing.	Pretend you are interviewing a character in your book. Write down 5 questions you would ask, and predict what their answers might be.	Research a person or event from the text. Make an informational poster to explain what you found.	Make a hypothesis about what may have changed if a character were in a different setting.	Choose a character and imagine he/she had to pack a suitcase for a trip. What would you find in it and why?
You have been asked to write a sequel to the novel. The main characters should be included. What new conflict will your character face? Will they apply the lessons they learned from the first novel or make the same mistakes?	Choose a scene from the novel and prepare an acting script. Make sure you list which character is speaking and any non-verbal cues the actors need to know about.	Choose a character in your book to run for president. What are some campaign promises that you could make in order to secure their vote? Write a persuasive speech asking the characters for their votes.	Choose two characters from your book. Create a conversation between them. Determine a setting and write dialogue for how you think they would interact.	Write an email to the author describing your opinion of the book or a specific part of the book. Tell him/her one thing you enjoyed, one thing you would change, and one question you still have.	Create a timeline that details the main events, in order in the book. Include specific dates when you can.
